MG 100 UK




We took the ferry to Portsmouth and made our way to Silverstone race track to enjoy the British centenary celebrations of MG along with thousands of MG enthusiasts from around the world.

Luckily, the weather was kind to the organisers all weekend and the celebrations kept everyone busy every minute of the time. The racing was particularly good and to see almost a hundred Pre War MGs on the long track was awesome! Russ Swift demonstrated the latest MGs by showing us how to park between two cars by doing a handbrake turn - as per the advert shown on TV a few years ago. And, lastly, the arena was venue to numerous motokhana demonstrations using the nimble Midget.

Other events on offer included a time line of MGs going back to a recreation of the first MG Super Sports sold to Oliver Arkell and the newest MG Cyberster, being the sports car that is still in the prototype stage of development.





Presentation of the GCMGCC Badge

Oliver Arkell, the son of the owner of Arkell Brewery in the UK, was the first person to buy an MG – a Rayworth bodied MG. In fact, six were built in 1923 with Rayworth bodies and a photograph of Oliver sitting proudly in his yellow Rayworth MG instigated Allan Ross, Regalia Officer of the Gold Coast MG Car Club to have 50 car badges made depicting the first (yellow) Rayworth MG.

The GCMGCC committee asked me to present a Rayworth MG car badge to the MGCC, UK, president, John Day, at a convenient time during Laurel and my holiday this year driving RIP, our 1961 MGA, to various MG centenary celebrations around Europe and the UK.



The opportunity arose during dinner on the evening of the last day of the centenary celebrations at Silverstone, when the International Director of the MGCC, Peter Cook, invited Laurel and I, along with John Day, to meet international guests from around the world, including passionate members of two Japanese MG Car Clubs.

My final words to John Day ended with “Do with it what you think best” and thought that it would end up being displayed in the regalia shop at Kimber House, Abingdon, along with 100’s of other badges.

But No!

And I quote:

“Hi Colin (Grant – MGCC Abingdon)

I was delighted and proud to receive the anniversary badge at Silverstone and presented it to Stephen Hiner in recognition of his efforts in building a replica of the Raworth bodied Morris special in time to show it as the first MG in the timeline.

It is now proudly displayed on the front of his car.

My decision to present to Stephen with the badge was because his Raworth is painted yellow, being exactly the same as the one depicted on the fabulous anniversary badge.



As his car is the only example of the Raworth it creates a massive amount of interest wherever he displays it, so the Gold Coast Club gets a lot of recognition as well.

I think this counts as a, “Win, Win” situation.

Stephen is very proud to be displaying the wonderful badge and understands its significance to the MG Car Club and the Gold Coast Club ...hands of friendship across the water.

I do hope Dave is in agreement with my decision and my reasons for doing it.

In summary, John Day decided to donate the badge to Stephen Hiner, the owner of the one and only Rayworth MG – albeit it an accurate recreation – and it now takes pride of place on the yellow Rayworth MG badge bar!

Arkells Brewery

Oliver's M.G was registered FC5855. It is reported that a young John Oliver Arkell went to the Morris Garages Queen Street showrooms in Oxford on 11th August 1923 to buy a 'Chummy'. Author Wilson McComb, in his book The Story of the M.G Sports Car, records that Oliver spied a 'yellow sports car in the window-an unusual yellow, the colour of good butter, and it had black wings.' Cecil Kimber, Manager of the garages, quoted a price of £300 for the M.G sports car, so Oliver agreed to buy it on the basis that it wasn't much more than the Chummy. Payment of a deposit was made, and his Raworth was registered on 16 August 1923, then on 5th September it was delivered to the family home, Redlands Court, Highworth, Wiltshire



Following the death of Oliver's father, James Arkell, who died aged 76 in 1925, Arkell's Brewery was carried on by brothers, James Graham, Thomas Noel (later Sir Noel), and Oliver Arkell; the grandsons of John Arkell, founder of the Swindon based brewery.

Master Class

The process for entry, category location and judging were all on the one form and handed to the entrants. The form contained a space for relevant information of the owner, and a tick box and circle for the car, category and class. Also on the form were the details for judging. The judges then simply used that form when judging. The entry list was numbered for the prize giveaways draw so no need for tickets.



The breakdown of numbers entered totalled forty cars, thirty one cars judged, twenty one in Pride of Ownership and ten in Concours including two in the Masters Class.

Thank you to Cheryl Robinson, Dave Godwin, Gary Stevens, Ian Rogers and Jim Haines who performed the difficult task of judging the cars. Trophy presentation will be at the end of year Presentation Lunch / Christmas Lunch at the Southport Yacht Club on Sunday the 26th November.




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The MG Shed Gilston.

Last Shed day Keith and Jean Bailey came along and brought another donation, this time of MGB parts, which were snapped up on the morning and another \$120 went to the shed project. Jean said she thought what we are doing at Gilston was the best thing the Club has done especially for the men with both physical and mental stimulation and getting them out of the house. The Baileys also brought Madeleine Weenink along to have a look at what we are doing and as a consequence, she has donated several items of garage equipment and supplies to the Shed from the late Neil's collection.

The Trailer is now completed and available for member's use and the advert has been reinserted in the magazine.

The cataloguing of the parts is still continuing, flowing a major revamp of the spare and new parts by Gary Stevens and Laurie Kinne and their helpers. When completed we will have the parts list on the website for all members to peruse and utilize. A notice board will be put on the wall in the Shed for members to list wanted parts of any model. 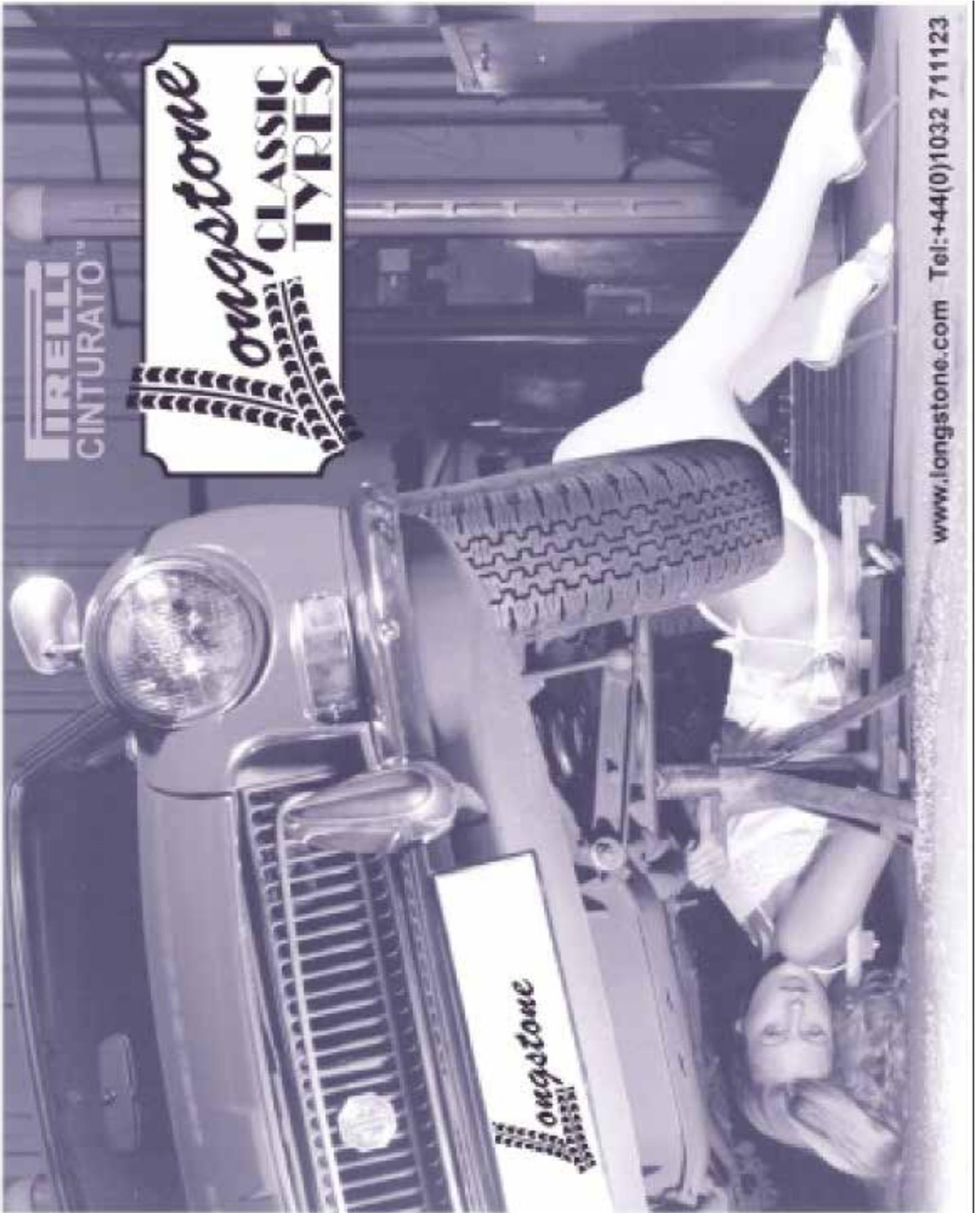

What are E-fuels?

eFuels are synthetic fuels that are a renewable electricity based and carbon neutral alternatives to conventional liquid fuels and are therefore ideally suited to reduce climate impacts in a decisive and affordable way in the transport sector. eFuels also enable passenger cars including classic, historic and vintage cars with combustion engines to continue to be operated but in a climate-neutral manner.

eFuel production is based on the extraction of hydrogen by means of an electrolysis process that breaks down water using renewable energy to generate the hydrogen. The hydrogen is then combined with carbon dioxide (CO₂) extracted from the atmosphere and converted into eFuel that is easy to store, simple to transport, and can be engineered to be a successful drop in fuel for all conventional fossil fuels.

E-fuels group HIF Global, (backed by Porsche), has chosen NW Tasmania as the site for a \$1 billion production plant for synthetic green fuels, to be located south set to produce up to 100 million litres a year of carbon-neutral with construction targeted to begin in 2024. QLD currently has a draft Sustainable Fuels Strategy under development that encompasses e-fuels and will be released for consultation in 2024.

There are multiple technologies to achieve these fuels and they contain fewer contaminants than in fossil fuels, so it is better for engines and the environment with Porsche claiming it reduces emissions by around 85 per cent compared to that emitted by today's unleaded fuels.

What are Biofuels?

Typically thought of as exclusively ethanol-based products, biofuels can now use biological feedstocks, preferably wastes, to generate hydrocarbon based "drop-in" fuels that can also serve as petroleum substitutes in existing vehicles, and smaller engines.

Hydrocarbon-based biofuels are created with the use of extreme heat and pressure to break down solid vegetable-derived materials (biomass) into intermediate liquids or gases at high temperatures (500°C–700°C) to break down biomass into vapor, gas, and char. Once the char is removed, the vapours are cooled and condensed into a liquid “bio-crude” oil, that can be further refined into different ‘drop-in’ grades of fuel. Obviously, this process is not carbon neutral, but is more climate-friendly than fossil fuels.

AMPOL and Japanese based Eneos Corporation signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) to explore the production of advanced biofuels at the Lytton refinery in Brisbane, with the capacity to generate up to 500 million litres of sustainable aviation fuel (SAF) and renewable diesel annually with initial work investing the use of agricultural, animal, and other waste feedstocks prevalent in Queensland.

Hydrogen

Hydrogen is a clean, renewable fuel that can be used in transport, power supply and a range of industrial processes. It’s already key for a range of industries that provide vital inputs into a range of manufacturing processes and our mining and agricultural sectors. Hydrogen can be produced from a variety of sources including renewables such as solar, wind and biomass.

QLD has committed to developing 4 hydrogen industry clusters focussed in and around Brisbane, Townsville, Gladstone and Toowoomba.

Current QLD Sustainable Vehicles and Fuels Policies

The QLD Government currently has a range of transport related strategies in place or in development as follows:

1. A Sustainable Zero Emissions Vehicle Strategy 2022-2032, mostly about Electric Vehicles & In- frastructure;
2. A Hydrogen Industry Strategy 2019-2024: To established Hydrogen Clusters and Industries; and
3. A Sustainable Fuels Strategy: A draft Sustainable Fuels Strategy is under development that will be released for consultation in 2024. The policy encompasses the development of e-fuels and biofuels stating ‘it is expected that users of existing petroleum fuels will, over time, transition to a mix of sustainable liquid fuels, renewable electricity and hydrogen’.

There is currently an ‘Options and Opportunities’ discussion paper available with specific questions being promoted for stakeholder feedback should you be interested in commenting.

RE: PETROL & DIESEL FUELS FOR HISTORIC VEHICLES

Thank you for contacting my office in relation to your concerns regarding fuel supply for historical vehicles.

I have received correspondence from the office of Hon Mick de Brenni MP, Minister for Energy, Renewables and Hydrogen and Minister for Public Works and Procurement who have advised me that there are no Queensland Government or Australian Government policies to ban the use of petroleum fuels (such as petrol and diesel) in the future, nor are there any policies to prohibit or restrict the use of existing petroleum fuelled internal combustion engine (ICE) vehicles on our roads.

Further, the Queensland Zero Emission Vehicle (ZEV) Strategy 2022-2032 sets out the Government's vision to create a cleaner, greener, integrated transport and energy network that encourages zero emission transport solutions and contributes to Queensland's net zero emissions future. Its stated priorities are to encourage cleaner, greener transport modes, build ZEV manufacturing and supply chain capability facilitate supportive ZEV infrastructure, drive towards renewables and smart charging and partnerships, innovation and advocacy.

I have also been advised that the vision includes targets for 50% of new passenger vehicles to be ZEVs by 2030, and 100% of new passenger vehicles to be ZEVs by 2036. Passenger vehicles include light passenger vehicles and SUVs.”

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
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
